How you could extend your learning:	 Places to visit Visit The British Museum – especially useful for the Greek side of the course as it contains a wide selection of remains from 5th Century Athens, including a large portion of the Parthenon frieze Films to Watch: BBC Documentary 'Who were the Greeks?' Often on iplayer and a good introduction to the Greek world. Bettany Hughes' Ancient World – 'Athens: The Truth about Democracy' and 'The Spartans' (Available on 4OD or YouTube) Eight Days that made Rome' – Bethany Hughes Ancient Invisible cities – Athens (Available on iplayer) excellent introduction to the city and its ancient architecture.
