<ul> <li>A Level (Philosophy, Ethics and Religion), Eduqas specification</li> <li>This is a 2-year course which focuses on the 3 key elements of Religion and Ethics, The Philosophy of Religion and the study of Buddhism. The course develops the skills needed to:</li> <li>Investigate ultimate questions such as "Who is responsible for the existence of evil in our world?", "Is there a God?" and considers the relationship between religion and psychology.</li> <li>Understand contemporary ethical and religious issues such as animal experimentation, and whether our behaviour is based upon our own self-</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>interest. Ask questions such as, "What kind of person should I be?" and "What does it really mean for an action to be 'right' or 'wrong'?"</li> <li>Study Buddhism and consider its main themes including: What is the root cause of human suffering? How can we live more mindfully and develop compassion for all beings? What happens when we die?</li> <li>Grades needed: College level 3 entry requirements, plus English Language grade 5</li> </ul>
