 A Level (Philosophy, Ethics and Religion), Eduqas specification This is a 2-year course which focuses on the 3 key elements of Religion and Ethics, The Philosophy of Religion and the study of Buddhism. The course develops the skills needed to: Investigate ultimate questions such as "Who is responsible for the existence of evil in our world?", "Is there a God?" and considers the relationship between religion and psychology. Understand contemporary ethical and religious issues such as animal experimentation, and whether our behaviour is based upon our own self-
 interest. Ask questions such as, "What kind of person should I be?" and "What does it really mean for an action to be 'right' or 'wrong'?" Study Buddhism and consider its main themes including: What is the root cause of human suffering? How can we live more mindfully and develop compassion for all beings? What happens when we die? Grades needed: College level 3 entry requirements, plus English Language grade 5

Questions to think about and/or write about – try to support your answers with reasoning: 1. Do you think there is a 'right' attitude and a 'wrong' attitude towards homosexuality? What is it that makes these attitudes right or wrong? 2. Some people might argue that different cultures have different ideas about morality, and that these different cultural beliefs should be respected even if we/you don't agree with them. Do you think we should always respect the beliefs and attitudes of cultures different from our own, or
