Following discussions with our team of Prevent Young Leaders, WQE has developed the **We Question Everything** @ **WQE** campaign.

We have created banks of resources for classrooms and corridors designed to encourage debate and conversations around challenging ideologies and themes, and delivered a CPD session on how we can work towards a more Cohesive Community. We also held a well attended and productive focus group for students to begin to develop an action plan for how best to tackle any misogynistic language or views, or any other hate speech heard within our College community. The session was supported by Dr Jenn Hobbs (Lecturer in International Relations) and Dr. Natasha Stoyce - both from the University of Leicester).

Our Content VS Context resources also caught the attention of the Department for Education, and they are keen to work with WQE in future regarding some of the current challenges in schools.

Our resources have been designed to promote conversation in a range of ways, from using imagery to suggest taking a closer look at the wider picture, to looking at alternative viewpoints to promote empathy towards others, even if at first you disagree with their ideas.

We look forward to continuing to work with both the University of Leicester and Department of Education to further improve our practice.

The SafeZone app covers the areas of both campuses and the routes inbetween, and can be used to call for assistance when needed.

## A GUIDE TO SOCIAL MEDIA - PART TWO



Twitter is an online news and social networking site where people communicate in short messages called tweets.

Tweeting is posting short messages for anyone who follows you on Twitter. Another description of Twitter and tweeting might be microblogging.

Every tweet is limited to a maximum of 280 characters. You join with a free account and Twitter name, and then you send broadcasts as frequently as you like.

Twitter allows users to connect with anyone in the world, but it has also become a dangerous place filled with harassment and abuse. People have been targeted by coordinated harassment campaigns that can involve anything from threats and spamming to account hacks and worse.



Minds is a free, open source social media network that has been described as more privacy-focused than other mainstream social media networks.

Minds uses cryptocurrency to pay their users to create content, and describes itself as focused on free speech, with the website urging users to 'take back control of your social media', and minimally moderating the content on the platform. It has also been noted that there is a high volume of far-right users and content on the platform.

Snapchat is a multi-media messaging app that allows pictures and videos to be sent between users and for 'stories' to be uploaded for anyone on the platform to see.



#### What are the risks of Snapchat?

- Inappropriate or harmful content Users could be at risk of viewing harmful or upsetting content and images.
- Location sharing -Snapchat Map shares your location with other users on the app.
- Unwanted contact Users may receive unwanted contact from adults or other young people using the app.
- Pressure to share Snapchat messages normally disappear after a short period of time once opened. This could put users more at risk of sharing something that makes them feel uncomfortable or could harm or upset someone else. It's important to remember that shared content can always be screenshotted by the recipient.
- Pressure to chat With 'streaks', there is a pressure to keep using the app and to achieve a high 'streak score'.
