

High Achievers Summer Package: Super-Curricular Resources

In the first instance, students should be working over the summer to consolidate and revise their A-level studies to ensure that they are able to meet or exceed their MTG, and this includes getting on with any NEA and/or EPQ work.

Thereafter, some targeted further reading and listening can foster curiosity and challenge you to develop stronger skills in understanding and analyzing complex extended prose that will aid your intellectual development ahead of applying to university. Students are encouraged to proactively seek academic sources from WQE's LRC, the University library, Jstor, the BBC, etc. that align with their own interests. 
