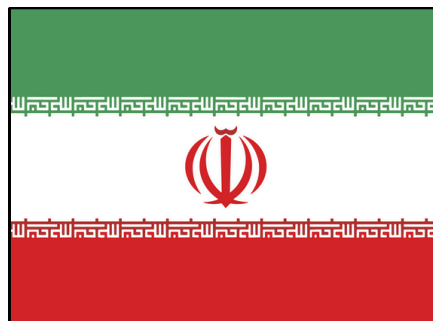

GLOBAL EVENTS: IRANIAN PROTESTS

WHAT'S HAPPENING?

(Information taken from BBC News website, correct as of 2pm, Wednesday 14th January 2026)

Ongoing anti-government protests, that started over the economy and inflation in Iran, have been taking place in Tehran, Iran's capital city, since 28th December 2025. Recently the protests have grown to become the largest Iran has seen in years.



Video footage has been circulating news agencies that appears to show extreme violence being used towards protestors, with over 2,400 protestors reportedly killed or detained. In an effort to try to stop the unrest, the Iranian Government have implemented a near-total internet blackout, which means since Thursday 8th January, Iranians have no means of contacting the outside world.

The violence seen on the news has been condemned by a number of countries including the UK and USA. Donald Trump, President of the United States, has warned the Iranian Government that 'very strong action' will be taken if detained protestors are executed. Given the ongoing internet blackout in Iran, it is difficult for news and security agencies to gather accurate information.

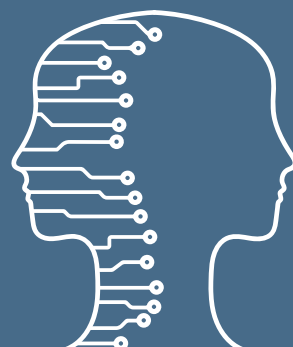
GROK AI DEEPFAKES



'Grok' is X's (formerly Twitter) own Artificial Intelligence tool. The social media platform is under pressure after reports of the AI tool allowing users to create sexual images, particularly of women and children.

One of the main concerns is '**digital-undressing**', where users ask Grok to remove clothing in images.

The UK's online regulator, Ofcom, has said it is urgently investigating whether Grok has broken British online safety laws. The UK Government is also working on a bill to make the creation of non-consensual intimate images with AI a criminal offence.



Using AI ChatBots for Good

You've probably heard of ChatGPT, the wonder AI chatbot. From writing poems to C.U.s, it seems there's nothing this artificial intelligence can't create! That does, unfortunately, include homework.

ChatGPT's terms of services says users must be at least 13 years old and those under 18 must have their parent or legal guardian's permission. However, between the press coverage and the lack of age verification, it's likely that many young people are using it regardless.

But is it *really* helping with homework? Here are some points to consider if the young person in your care wants to use an AI chatbot.

-  **SOMETIMES AI CHATBOTS ARE WRONG!**
This means if someone is relying on them for facts, they might be wrong too. And it might become obvious that they've used AI to complete their work.
-  **CHATBOTS AREN'T ALWAYS UP TO DATE.**
ChatGPT knows about the world up until 2021, after that its knowledge is limited.
-  **CHATBOTS ARE BANNED IN SOME PLACES.**
If a young person is using chatbots but their school has banned it, they might have to face the consequences of breaking the rules.
-  **EVERY VOICE IS UNIQUE.**
Although you can ask a chatbot to create text in a certain way, it's incredibly unlikely that it will sound identical to the user... and even if a young person doesn't think they have a writing style, you can bet their teachers do!

CHATBOTS AREN'T ALWAYS SHORTCUTS

By the time you're finished fact-checking and editing the grammar, you may as well have written it yourself!

Alternative ideas for using AI together

PRACTICE FACT CHECKING

Knowing how to fact check is a very useful skill, both for school and for everyday life. Ask ChatGPT for facts then check them together by Googling, in the news and even in good old-fashioned books!

Being able to tell fact from fiction will also help you and the young person in your care spot fake news and misinformation on social media.

USE CHATGPT TO INSPIRE

Instead of making the chatbot do all the work, use it for prompting ideas. For example, you can give an example of your favourite novel and ask for recommendations of similar books you might enjoy.

I am 14 years old.
My favourite book is the Hobbit.
Can you suggest three novels I might like?

Sure, here are three book suggestions you might enjoy based on your love of The Hobbit:

1. Eragon by Christopher Paolini ...

MASTER THE SKILL OF EDITING

The text produced by AI chatbots usually needs a lot of changing. Practising editing text for spelling, grammar and comprehension could help improve schoolwork.

LEARN ABOUT AI

There's no denying that artificial intelligence like chatbots can be fascinating. How does it learn information? Who made it? Researching this together could even inspire a future career in AI!

STAYING SAFE WHEN USING AI

Make sure the young person in your care knows who their trusted adults are and that they can talk to them if they see something that upsets or worries them online.

Harmful, unhelpful and untrue answers on ChatGPT can be reported by selecting the 'thumbs down' button beside the answer.

Some young people have been using AI for mental health advice. Talk to the young person in your care about what to do if they're feeling depressed, stressed, or upset.

For young people, using AI as a way to get out of homework might be very tempting. If you know the young person in your care is using AI chatbots, talk to them about the *possible risks*, *age limits* and *alternative ways* you can use AI chatbots together as a *force for good*.

INSIDE THE MIND OF A 16-YEAR-OLD

In November 2025, **Demos**, Britain's leading cross-party think tank, published research titled 'Inside the Mind of a 16-year-old.' Researchers travelled across the UK and ran workshops with 16-18 year olds, asking them questions about their lives on and off social media, the people who influence them, the politics this fuels and the futures they hope for. From the workshops, **5 archetypes of young people** were designed:



THE ACTIVIST

- **Politics:** Left-wing, socially progressive, environmentally conscious
- **Interests:** Climate change, social justice, human rights, LGBTQ+ rights, feminism
- **Outlook on Life:** Optimistic but frustrated with slow political change; believe in radical systemic reform and big changes to the way society is run
- **Lifestyle:** Engage in protests, support ethical brands, involved in online activism, might vote Labour, Green, or a smaller leftist party

THE ENTREPRENEUR

- **Politics:** Centrist to right-leaning, pro-business, believes in meritocracy
- **Interests:** Startups, side hustles, cryptocurrency, AI, financial independence
- **Outlook on Life:** Opportunistic and individualistic; focused on personal success over systemic change
- **Lifestyle:** Invests in stocks/crypto, follows business influencers, engaged in self-improvement and productivity culture

THE CRITICAL REALIST

- **Politics:** Apathetic or anti-establishment, distrusts mainstream parties, often cynical and despondent
- **Interests:** Memes, alternative media, conspiracies, gaming, dark humour
- **Outlook on Life:** Feels powerless in a broken system; distrusts institutions, often disengaged from traditional politics
- **Lifestyle:** Spends a lot of time online, sceptical of the news, more likely to engage in passive resistance than activism

THE TRADITIONALIST

- **Politics:** Right-leaning, socially conservative, patriotic, possibly religious
- **Interests:** History, British history and traditions, cultural preservation, Royalist
- **Outlook on Life:** Believes the country has lost its way due to cultural and social changes; values tradition and order
- **Lifestyle:** Supports Brexit, follows figures like Nigel Farage or GB News, may aspire to careers in the military or law enforcement

THE CONNECTOR

- **Politics:** Believe people should live the life they want, disengaged from political discussions
- **Interests:** Pop culture, reality TV, influencer trends, nightlife, social media
- **Outlook on Life:** Focused on personal enjoyment, status, and social life over political issues
- **Lifestyle:** Active on TikTok and Instagram, follows celebrity gossip, more concerned with lifestyle trends than political debates.

Of course, not every young person will fit perfectly into one of these categories. However, they give a good overview of the concerns of our young people and what they are passionate about. It is important to engage young people in topical discussions.

YOUTH HOMELESSNESS



In 2023-2024, an estimated **118,134** young people in the UK approached their local authorities because they were at risk of homelessness. In England, the figure increased by 12% from the previous year.

One young person faced homelessness approximately **every 4 minutes** in the UK in 2023-2024.

Reasons for youth homelessness:

- Family or friends no longer willing or able to accommodate (50%)
- Domestic abuse (10%)
- End of assured shorthold tenancy (8%)
- Required to leave accommodation provided by Home Office as asylum support (6%)
- Evicted from support housing (5%)
