TASK 1: How accurate is memory?

For this first task, we will look at one of the topics you'll be studying early in the course. Elizabeth Loftus is researcher who has made some very important discoveries about how memory works and why it cannot always be trusted. Watch this short video about her research using this link:

Now answer these questions:

1. What did she discover about the effects of leading questions on memory?
2. What implications does her research have for the criminal justice process, e.g. police interviews, the credibility of eyewitness testimony in court?
3. Do you think your memories could be altered in the way she claims? Why/Why not?

TASK 2 - Other Psychology studies

In preparation for A level Psychology it would be helpful to read and think critically about current psychological research. You can access a variety of research studies via The British Psychological Society (BPS) Research Digest: [The British Psychological Society's Research Digest | BPS](#)

Choose **one** research study from the website above. This could be a study in the feed that you find particularly interesting, or you could use the search box to find research relating to a topic you will study next year (e.g. memory, attachment, conformity, obedience, phobias, OCD, depression).

For the study that you have chosen, complete the following questions. Try to keep your answers to each of the questions brief.

NOTE: The Research Digest website includes a mixture of psychological research studies and other general articles about psychological topics. To complete the tasks below you will need to find examples of psychological research.

1. What are the names of the psychologists or the name of the study?
2. What is the aim of the study? (What question is it about?)
3. Who are the participants/ the individual or group of people used in the study?
4. What did the participants in the study have to do? (Different participants may have had to do different things) or how was the study conducted?
5. What did the study find?
6. What conclusions can be drawn from this study?
7. What are the limitations with the study?
8. Could the findings from the study be useful in any way?
